Disasters

- Events may occur, that can make the environment around you unsafe.
- They can happen: to Anyone, Anytime, Anywhere
- This problem can be made worse when surrounded by those who are not prepared and look to you for help.
- Much worse is it when large numbers of people in a city are not prepared and start to suffer.



Home

- Stay at HOME if you can.
 - Your home is your best shelter.
 - Home has all your supplies.





Problems in Cities

- Cities are not self-sustaining.
- They don't have enough resources to support the population.
- Resources from other areas are needed to keep a city supplied. These include, Food, Water and Electricity.
- Cities are not self-sufficient and would run out of supplies in about a week if supplies were disrupted.



Problems in Cities

- 5 major risks may take place during a crisis in a city.
 1. Loss of Power
 2. Lack of Food
 3. Lack of Water
 4. Quarantine
 5. The Collapse of Social Order
- Sometimes the mere threat of one of the above is enough to cause concern or even panic.



Emergency Alert System



EAS / NWR S.A.M.E.

- NOAA Weather Radio All Hazards (NWR) is a nationwide network of radio stations broadcasting continuous weather & emergency info. NWR also broadcasts warning & post-event info. for all types of hazards - including natural (ex. earthquakes or avalanches), environmental (ex. chemical releases or oil spills), and public safety (ex. AMBER alerts or 911 Telephone outages).
- Broadcasts are found in the VHF public service band at these 7 frequencies:



Some Warning Signs

- Loss of Power
 - Applies to wide-scale outages
 - At first, power outages have a novelty about them. This quickly disappears as the outage lasts more than a couple hours.
 - Without power...banks, gas stations and other business will be closed.
 - Looting begins as the most unprepared run out of resources and those who feel they can get away with it, start to loot.
 - Looting will start with businesses and move to suburban residential areas within a couple days.
 - Leave town early.



Some Warning Signs

- Lack of Food
 - Grocery stores have about a 1 week supply of food, with more shipped in daily.
 - With no food shipments, panic can set-in within 3 days.
 - Within minutes of news that food shipments will stop or slowdown, a mad dash of customers will purchase the necessities in the stores until they are completely depleted.
 - Once it is evident the shortage will last for more than a week, a mass exodus will begin.
 - Looting will begin; first businesses, then homes.



Some Warning Signs

- Lack of Water
 - People can live without water for only 2-3 days
 - Loss of Power = No Water. Water treatment plants and pumping stations depend on electricity. Generators are temporary.
 - Homeland Security recognizes our water supply as the easiest, most susceptible and largest-impact target to would-be terrorists.
 - By day two, people will get very worried. All bottled water will be purchased from the store leaving the shelves bare.
 - As no water is available at stores, a mass exodus will begin.
 - Looting will begin; first businesses then homes.
 - Any local water supply, lakes, streams, rivers, canals will become polluted as sanitation breakdown occurs. A mass outbreak of water-borne diseases will occur.



Some Warning Signs

- Quarantine


- Sometimes you may not have the option to leave town.
 - Quarantines or curfews may be imposed to control disease outbreaks or control widespread disturbances.
- Watch for the signs and leave town before the option to do so is taken away from you.
 - For Quarantines, ER's will fill up quickly and schools will shut-down first.
 - Curfews will be imposed to control riots or wide-scale looting.
- Those without proper supplies (Food, Water, Medicine, etc..) could begin looting or rioting if supplies are not made available.



Some Warning Signs

- The Collapse of Social Order
 - The L.A. Riots following the Rodney King trial verdict
 - New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina
 - Once the people realize emergency services are overwhelmed or non-existent, the psychological barrier of “order” melts away and lawlessness can take over.
 - What leads to the collapse of social order? Lack of Food, Water, Utilities or Money or the threat thereof.

Mass Exodus





Mass Exodus

- As people leave the cities, en masse. Gas stations will close as their employees leave town as well.
- Those that stay open, will be quickly depleted.
- People will only be able to travel as far as their tank of gas will take them.
- Mass traffic jams will occur on the outbound highways as people run out of gas and abandon their vehicles.
- If bad enough, this could actually block the highways and trap people in the cities. (Ex. Hurricane Rita)
- As people become desperate, looting will take place within a gas tank radius of the city.



Leaving Town



Leaving Town

- Know where you are going. Have an out of town friend or family member that will take you in.
- Roads may be blocked, off-roading may be necessary (Leave early to avoid this)
- You will need lots of supplies, plan ahead and have supplies ready (Larger car/trailer is helpful) or supply caches along your escape route
- Fuel: If you don't have enough, you can't go far. (Ideally store enough fuel to reach your destination or 2 tanks full)
- Don't travel alone, plan on leaving in small to large groups.



Dangers of Leaving Town

- You're severely limited in how much you can carry.
- You have limited range due to fuel.
- You expose yourself to social chaos, roadblocks, random violence, etc.
- Your house may be looted while you're gone.
- You run the risk of mechanical breakdowns of your vehicle.
- You must have a place to go that you know is in better shape than where you currently are.



Sticking Together



Sticking Together

- If you are forced to stay, it is impossible for you to face looters or gangs by yourself.
- Neighbors may work together to protect the entire neighborhood.
- Organized resistance will encourage gangs or looters to go where there is minimal resistance.
- Supplies may be traded to unprepared neighbors in return for help with the protection effort.
- To avoid your neighbors from being the threat, help them be informed and get prepared.
- Every neighbor, church member or family member that is prepared is one less person you'll have to support.
- Prepare enough to Share!!!!



Things to Consider

- Get Prepared!
- Start with the Basics.
 - 90 Day Food Supply
 - Water
 - Free from Debt
 - Long Term Food Storage
- Don't Panic or Encourage Panic in others.
- Be aware of the warning signs.
- Get out of town early.
- Plan ahead, know where you are going, be ready.
- Befriend your neighbors, help them prepare.


Evacuation Plan

- If you are forced to evacuate, you most likely won't have the time to stop and buy the appropriate maps and plan your route or communicate with family.
- Make your plans NOW where you will regroup if separated and what routes you will take.

- First!....Prepare for emergencies that are most likely to occur.
- Make a list of possible emergencies & rate them in order of likelihood.
